

Karin was an amazing volunteer who really made a positive impact on visitors to the Information Centre, with her knowledgeable help given to both travellers and locals.

Her photos consistently highlighted the beauty of nature and demonstrated her deep connection and understanding of wildlife and flora.

Karin was keen to inspire other people to look, to admire and to therefore, want to help preserve all our natural wonders. She took pleasure in exhibiting and sharing her photographs with many locals and visitors, gaining popularity for her ability to capture the essence of nature.

Karin was a remarkable lady, known for her kindness, understanding, sense of humour, and passion for wild places, animals, and above all, her family.

It was mentioned at her funeral, of her love of the landscape, especially rocks at beaches to photograph.

Karin was a MACS member for a very long time and gave much of her own time to MACS's exhibitions and galleries.

She is well remembered for working at the Narooma Visitor Centre, with great affection by those who worked with her. She helped visitors and locals alike with information. Karin was highly valued and an integral part of everything MACS did, she was a tireless volunteer always ready and willing to help.

Karin had a particular interest in sales of books about local beaches as she wanted to share her knowledge and interest in Narooma. Karin loved to chat to travellers dropping in to the Centre. She also had a stall at the regular Tilba market on a Saturday morning, where she sold photographs of the local landscape, (her husband) Ziggy's paintings and her own local produce. Many people who had worked with her and Ziggy at the market attended the funeral.

### **Oyster Festival Wrap**



The River of Art were incredibly proud to be part of such a vibrant and successful weekend. A heartfelt congratulations to everyone involved in bringing this exceptional event to life.

The Pink Cube Gallery welcomed record numbers, with visitors delighted to explore works by some of our 2024 Art Prize finalists. One piece even found a new home in Dubai, a joyful reminder of both the festival and the beauty of our region.

Our mobile gallery showcased an inspiring lineup of artists, including David Campbell; Freya Job, our 2022 Art Prize winner; and Bomber Krellaxiom, whose interactive soundscapes invited audiences to hear the "Oyster Screeeem!" 

Established in 1997 in memory of the artist Penny Meagher, the emphasis of the Windmill Trust Scholarship is to support visual artists from regional NSW to take up career development and/or presentation opportunities for their work.

The Windmill Trust Scholarship supports artists in various career aspects, including independent artistic research or practice, professional development, exhibiting and presenting work in new ways. Financial support encompasses studio rental, materials or labour costs, framing, space rental, promotion, artists' fees, freight, installation, and documentation.

One individual or group will be awarded up to \$10,000.

Applications for Windmill Trust Scholarship for Regional NSW Artists will open online, Monday 12 May 2025, 9.00 am and close Monday 7 July 2025, midnight AEST.
